1. **Learning Objectives:** This course covers the techniques of constrained optimization and equilibrium analysis; it relies heavily on differential calculus. You will learn the foundations of consumer and producer behavior and the positive and normative analysis of their interaction in perfectly and imperfectly competitive markets. You will learn and practice skills in this course that are applied in virtually every course in the undergraduate economics curriculum.

3. **Prerequisites:** Introduction to Microeconomics 220:102 and Calculus I 640:135 or 640:151 (C or better in each)
4. **Attendance:** Attendance is necessary to benefit from this class. If you miss a class, you are responsible for the material that was covered. Poor attendance will be reflected in the homework and exams.
5. **Exams:**
 - There will be 3 exams. You will be given the exam dates at the beginning of the semester, so you are expected to plan accordingly.
 - There are **NO** make-up exams or quizzes in this class. If you miss an exam for any DOCUMENTED reason, your final average will be redistributed accordingly, provided
 - (1) I am notified before the exam or within 24 hours after the exam and
 - (2) I am provided documentation that supports a **legitimate** reason for your absence—for example, illness, injury, or family emergency.
