- (1) Inequality (220:120) and Choice and Strategy in Politics (220:390) do not have 102 and 103 (or 200) as prerequisites.
- (2) Students may use no more than two of the following courses for the Economics major: 220:300, 220:435, and 220:436.
- (3) Econ of Globalization (220:307) also has a prerequisite of 220:300 or 220:435 or 220:436.
- (4) Students who have credit for 220:304 offered Fall 2010 may not get degree or major credit for 220:464.
- (5) 220:480 has prerequisites of 220:320, 220:322, and Calculus II.
- (6) 220:481, 482, and 483 have prerequisites of 220:320, Statistics, and Calculus II.

To declare major

- o Take 220:102 (Intro to Micro), 220:103 (Intro to Macro) and 640:135 (Calculus I)
- o Receive a grade of C or better in all three of the above courses.
- o Log onto MyMajor.SAS.Rutgers.edu and select Economics as your first or second major.
- o (Optional) Come to New Jersey Hall, Room 202 anytime during normal business hours to be advised.

To graduate with economics major

- o Grade of C or better in all the Core classes listed above.
- Credit for seven electives in economics; at least four of these must be "upper-level" electives. See the front of this sheet for lists of the lower- and upper-level elective courses in economics. As of fall 2016 all upper level electives are 400-level.
- o Starting in spring 2010, *Managerial Economics* (220:308) will no longer be counted toward the major. However, students who took *Managerial Economics* (220:308) before spring 2010 will be allowed to use the course as a lower-level elective towards the major.
- O Students may use no more than two of the following courses for the Economics major: *International Economics* (220:300), *International Trade* (220:435), and *International Finance & Macroeconomics* (220:436).
- o A limit of one grade of D in an elective may be counted toward the major.
- o A minimum GPA of 2.0 in your economics classes is required. Calculus and Statistics <u>do not count</u> in the determination of your economics GPA.
- o A maximum of three <u>approved</u> classes taken outside the RU-New Brunswick Economics Department can be counted toward the major

To graduate with economics minor

- o Grade of C or better in 220:102, 220:103, 220:212 or 220:322
- o For the remaining three courses that count toward the economics minor, a limit of one grade of D may count toward the minor.
- o Students who declare the minor after spring 2017 need to take *Economic Data Analytics* 220:212 and 3 electives.
- Managerial Economics (220:308) may be used as an elective for the minor only. Economic Data Analytics 220:212 may be used as an elective for students who declared the minor in spring 2017 or earlier.
- O Starting fall 2010, students may only use only **one** of the following two courses towards the Economics minor: *Managerial Economics* (01:220:308) and *Engineering Economics* (14:540:343).
- o A maximum of two <u>approved</u> classes taken outside the RU-New Brunswick Economics Department can be counted toward the minor

Accounting Classes

Intro to Financial Accounting (010:272) and Intro to Managerial Accounting (010:275) may be used as lower-level electives for the Economics major. However, they are counted as classes taken outside the RU-New Brunswick Economics Department.

Policy on Courses from RU-Newark and RU-Camden

- O Students will no longer be able to use RU-Newark and RU-Camden courses in Intermediate Microeconomics, Intermediate Macroeconomics, and Econometrics towards the SAS Economics major. Please note that this policy is not retroactive: students who have taken these courses in the spring of 2011 or earlier semesters will be allowed to use them to fulfill SAS Economics major requirements.
- o Intro to Micro and Macro classes taken at RU-Newark or RU-Camden need to be preapproved. See our policy on Online Courses and Short Courses.

Policy on Online Courses

We do not accept courses as prerequisite equivalent when grades are not substantially based on proctored or identity-secure administration of a cumulative final exam (i.e. 50% or more of the final grade). All online courses should be preapproved.

Policy on Short Courses (Winter Session)

o Courses that meet for less than 4 weeks will not be accepted for transfer towards the Economics Major.
